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QUESTION NO: 1

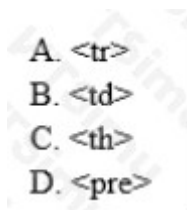

`<!--Clyde Davis, 9/17/2012. This code validates to HTML5-->` is correct because HTML comments use the precise delimiter pair `<!--` to begin the comment and `-->` to end it. Everything placed between those delimiters is comment text, so the author name, date, and validation note are retained in the page source for other developers while not being rendered as visible page content in a browser. Comments are useful for brief maintenance notes such as authorship, revision context, or implementation details, particularly on an intranet where multiple developers may maintain the same document. The comment syntax is part of HTML's markup rules and is recognized by HTML5 parsers. To keep the markup conforming and reliably parsed, the opening and closing comment delimiters must not contain inserted spaces: they are written exactly as `<!--` and `-->`. The WHATWG HTML Standard defines comments as markup beginning with `<!--` and ending with `-->`; MDN also documents this syntax and its use for notes that are not displayed in the document. The header's scope can also be explicitly identified with the `scope` attribute, improving how assistive technologies associate a heading with its related cells. An `<aside>` identifies content that is related indirectly to surrounding content, such as a sidebar, pull quote, or supplemental material. Using these elements makes a document's outline and landmarks more meaningful to developers, assistive technologies, and search-related tools, while CSS remains responsible for presentation. The HTML Standard defines these as semantic elements with specific document-structure roles; see the [HTML Living Standard: Sections](#) and MDN's [HTML element reference](#).

QUESTION NO: 6

You are creating a style sheet to format the pages on your company's Web site. One section will have a black background with white text. What is the hexadecimal reference you would use to specify the text color for this portion of the Web page?

require the leading hash character to identify hexadecimal notation, and the six hexadecimal digits must immediately follow it; no space belongs between the hash and the value. CSS also permits the equivalent shorthand form #FFF, but #FFFFFF is the full hexadecimal reference requested here. The CSS Color specification defines the six-digit notation as a legacy color syntax, while MDN documents its use in normal CSS color declarations. The central classification remains infringement because the conduct violates exclusive rights associated with a copyright or trademark.
