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QUESTION NO: 1

A sales rep at Universal Containers is adjusting pricing for a subscription Product on a new business Quote. The Subscription Term Is 24 months. The Product's Default Subscription Term Is

12 months, The Quantity is 10, The List Unit Price is \$120.

If a 10% Volume Discount, 20% Additional Discount, and 5% Partner Discount are applied, what are the values at each step in the standard price waterfall?

- A. Regular Unit Price: \$108.00 Customer Unit Price: \$168.00 Net Unit Price: \$156.00
- B. Regular Unit Price: \$108.00 Customer Unit Price: \$86.40 Net Unit Price: \$82.08
- C. Regular Unit Price: \$216.00 Customer Unit Price: \$172.80 Net Unit Price: \$164.16
- D. Regular Unit Price: \$240.00 Customer Unit Price: \$216.00 Net Unit Price: \$164.16

ANSWER: D

Explanation:

Regular Unit Price: \$240.00; Customer Unit Price: \$216.00; Net Unit Price: \$164.16 is correct. For a subscription product, Salesforce CPQ uses the subscription term and the product's default subscription term to derive a proration multiplier. Here, the multiplier is 24 divided by 12, or 2. The \$120.00 list unit price is therefore prorated to a Regular Unit Price of \$240.00. Quantity does not change these unit-price fields; it affects extended amounts instead.

The 10% volume discount is applied to the regular unit price, producing a Customer Unit Price of \$216.00 ($\240.00×0.90). The 5% partner discount is then applied in the partner-price stage, resulting in \$205.20. Finally, the 20% additional discount is applied to that amount to produce the Net Unit Price: \$164.16 ($\205.20×0.80). This follows CPQ's standard waterfall sequencing, in which subscription proration establishes the regular price before discount schedule, partner, and additional discount calculations determine the final net price. QUESTION NO: 2

Universal Containers wants to give a 25% discount on a specific Product Option purchased in the big Box bundle.

In which two ways could the admin configure CPQ to automatically apply this discount?

- B. Set the Option Discount (%) field on the Product Option for the bundle.
- C. Set Discounted by Package to TRUE on the Product Option for the bundle.

ANSWER: B D

Explanation:

Setting the Option Discount (%) field on the Product Option for the bundle is a direct declarative way to assign a fixed discount to that individual option. When the option is selected as part of the bundle, Salesforce CPQ applies the configured percentage to that option's quote line. This supports the requirement because the discount is defined on the specific Product Option rather than being applied broadly to every option in a feature or to the package as a whole.

Creating a Price Rule that applies the 25% discount when the product is added as part of the bundle is also appropriate. A price rule can evaluate quote and configuration conditions, then use a price action to populate the applicable discount field for the targeted option line. This approach is especially useful when the discount must be conditional, such as applying only in a particular bundle, for a particular customer segment, or when other configuration criteria are met. Salesforce CPQ price

QUESTION NO: 3

Universal Containers has a bundle with two Product Features: a Standard Treatments feature with Option Selection Method set to Dynamic, and a Custom Treatment feature. The Standard Treatments feature filters for products that are tagged Standard. If a user selects any option from Custom Treatments, selecting options from Standard Treatments is prohibited.

Which two steps can the Admin take to resolve the issue? (Choose two.)

- A. Create a selection Product Rule that hides all Standard Treatment options when Custom Treatment options are selected.
- B. Create a filter Product Rule that excludes all products on the Standard Treatment feature when Custom Treatment options are selected.

ANSWER: B C

Explanation:

“Create a filter Product Rule that excludes all products on the Standard Treatment feature when Custom Treatment options are selected” is appropriate because the Standard Treatments feature uses the Dynamic option selection method. Filter product rules are designed to control which products are available in dynamic bundle features. The rule can evaluate whether a Custom Treatment has been selected and then exclude products matching the Standard tag, preventing users from choosing a Standard Treatment after that condition is met.

“Create a selection Product Rule that removes all Standard Treatment options when Custom Treatment options are selected” complements the filtering behavior by handling Standard Treatment options that may already be selected when the user chooses a Custom Treatment. A selection rule’s Remove action updates bundle selections automatically when its conditions are satisfied, so the quote configuration remains compliant as the user changes choices.

Together, the filter rule controls future availability in the dynamic feature, while the selection rule clears conflicting existing selections. Salesforce documents filter rules as the mechanism for filtering products in dynamic bundles and selection rules as the mechanism for automatically adding or removing bundle options. QUESTION NO: 4

Universal Containers has a Quote that contains a Quote Line associated to an Asset Product in addition to another Quote Line.

Explanation:

Subscription Pricing equals Percent Of Total is required because the additional quote line must be identified as a subscription-priced percent-of-total line for Salesforce CPQ to carry its subscription behavior through contracting and create the associated subscribed asset. The Subscription Pricing field controls how CPQ treats the product's subscription charge, including whether that recurring charge is calculated as a percentage of designated quote-line totals. When the quote is contracted, CPQ uses the quote line's subscription information to create the appropriate subscription and asset relationship, rather than treating the line merely as a one-time calculated charge.

Percent-of-total subscription products are commonly used for recurring services, such as support or administration, whose price is based on the value of other products on the quote. Setting Subscription Pricing to Percent Of Total ensures that the line is configured as a subscription percent-of-total charge and retains the necessary subscription context at contract generation. Salesforce documents percent-of-total product configuration, including the distinction between percent-of-total pricing and percent-of-total subscription pricing, at [Salesforce Help: Percent of Total Products](#). QUESTION NO: 5

Universal containers has an add-on product that can only sold as part of bundles.

Which two steps should the admin take to meet this requirement?

Choose 2 answers

- A. Set the component checkbox to TRUE on the add-on product record.
- B. Create a product Option records referencing the add-on product on each bundle.
- C. Set the customer community availability picklist on the add-on Product to never.

ANSWER: A B

Explanation:

To make an add-on product available only within bundles, the administrator should set the Component checkbox to TRUE on the add-on product record and create Product Option records referencing that add-on product on each bundle. The Component setting identifies the product as a bundle component rather than a standalone item intended for direct selection in the quote line editor. This supports the requirement that sales users obtain the product through bundle configuration.

A Product Option record is then needed for every bundle that should offer the add-on. Product Options establish the relationship between a bundle parent product and its selectable child product, and they can also carry bundle-specific configuration details such as quantity, required status, selection behavior, and feature assignment. Creating the option relationship for each applicable bundle ensures that the same component product is presented only in the appropriate bundle contexts.

This combination separates the product's standalone availability from its bundle placement: the product is designated as a component, while Product Option records define exactly which bundles contain it. Salesforce CPQ bundle configuration is based on parent products and their Product Option child records. QUESTION NO: 6

Universal Containers has a multi-level bundle with a Percent of Total option at the first level. This Percent of Total option's calculation should be based only on other options at the same level.

Explanation:

Set the percent of Total Scope field on the Product Option record to a value of Components. In Salesforce CPQ, a Percent of Total product calculates its price by applying its configured percentage to a defined set of quote lines. The Percent of Total Scope field determines that set. For a multi-level bundle, the Components scope limits the calculation base to the other component options at the Percent of Total option's own bundle level. This produces a sibling-level calculation, which is exactly what is needed when the first-level option must derive its price only from other first-level options rather than from nested child options or unrelated quote lines.

This configuration belongs on the Product Option record because the option's position and behavior within its parent bundle determine the applicable component set. The percentage itself is configured through the option's Percent of Total settings, while Components supplies the intended calculation boundary. Salesforce documents Percent of Total products and explains that scope controls the products included in the calculation. QUESTION NO: 7

A sales rep at Universal Containers is trying to determine why a new Contract was unable to be created from a recently contracted Order. The sales rep has confirmed that the Order is for a new customer. This is the sales rep's first attempt to contract the Order.

What are three troubleshooting steps an admin should take to identify the issue?

Choose 3 answers

- A. Confirm that each of the Order Products have been activated.
- B. Ensure the Order Start Date is later than the Opportunity Close Date.

ANSWER: A C E

Explanation:

"Confirm that each of the Order Products have been activated," "Check recent Apex Jobs to identify any errors in the contracting process," and "Ensure there is at least one subscription-based Order Product on the Order" are the appropriate checks. CPQ contracting processes the order's subscription products to create the subscription and contracted-price records associated with a new contract. Therefore, the order must contain at least one line that represents a subscription product; a one-time-only order provides no subscription record for CPQ to contract. The products represented by the order lines must also be active and available for the contracting transaction to process reliably. In practice, an administrator should validate the active status of the underlying Product records and applicable price book entries for the order products. Finally, contracting can invoke asynchronous Apex and custom automation. Reviewing recent Apex Jobs is an effective diagnostic step because job failures and exception details can identify automation, validation, integration, or trigger behavior that interrupted creation of the Contract and related CPQ records. Salesforce's CPQ documentation describes how CPQ uses subscription records during contracting, and Salesforce's product documentation covers maintaining active products for use in transactions. QUESTION NO: 8

Quote line groups are especially relevant when the quote has been organized into logical sections, such as product categories, project phases, or locations.

Template Section with Template Content of Line Items type has a value in Group Field because the Line Items template content record can independently specify the field used to group the rendered quote lines. The document generator evaluates that configured field and creates groupings from its values. For example, grouping by a product-related field can separate line items wherever that field's value changes. Reviewing both the quote's related line groups and the Group Field configured on the Line Items template content identifies the sources that govern the document's displayed line-item grouping. Salesforce documents quote-template line-item grouping behavior in [Group Items in Quote Templates](#) and related template configuration concepts in [Quote Templates](#).

QUESTION NO: 9

Upon renewal of a Contract, a user has reported that bundles are being created without preserving the structure. This leads to validation errors and unwanted price changes. The admin has identified that Preserve Bundle Structure is set to FALSE on a system generated Contract record.

What should the admin do to prevent this Issue from happening in the future?

- A. Set Preserve Bundle Structure to TRUE on existing Account Records, and update the Re-evaluate Bundle Logic on Renewals setting in the Installed Package Settings to TRUE.

ANSWER: B

Explanation:

Set Preserve Bundle Structure to TRUE on existing Contract and Account Records, and update the Preserve Bundle Structure setting in the Installed Package Settings to TRUE. Salesforce CPQ uses the Preserve Bundle Structure setting to retain the original parent-child relationships of bundle products when it creates renewal opportunities and renewal quotes. Retaining those relationships ensures that options remain associated with their bundle parent, so the renewal process starts with a configuration consistent with the contracted sale.

The package-level setting establishes the intended default behavior for subsequently generated records, which addresses future renewals. Updating Account records is also important because account-level renewal settings can be used when CPQ

generates contracts and renewal data. Updating existing Contract records corrects contracts already in scope for a future renewal, preventing them from continuing to supply a false value when their renewal quote is generated. Together, these updates align the relevant existing data with the installed-package default, allowing CPQ to preserve bundle structure consistently for both current contractual records and newly generated contracts.

QUESTION NO: 10

Selecting Tabs instructs the configurator to render each Product Feature as a separate tab, creating the requested additional level of categorization while users configure the bundle. The administrator can then use the Product Feature fields, such as Feature Name and Number, to give each tab a clear label and control its display order. This design keeps the bundle's option-selection experience easier to navigate, especially when it contains numerous options spanning distinct functional areas. Salesforce documentation identifies Option Layout as a field on the product that determines how options and features are displayed during configuration, including the Tabs layout. Product Features remain the mechanism for assigning individual product options to the appropriate group within that tabbed interface. QUESTION NO: 11

Universal Containers sells a monthly subscription service with tiered pricing:

Which pricing method should the admin select for this service?

Explanation:

Block is the appropriate Salesforce CPQ pricing method because the service has an initial fixed charge for a defined quantity and then uses overage rates that change at specified quantity thresholds. Block pricing lets an administrator define quantity blocks with a block price, such as \$1,000 for the initial 100 units, and an overage rate for quantity beyond the block. The subsequent blocks can establish the accumulated starting price and the applicable per-unit overage rate: \$4,600 at 500 units with an \$8 overage rate, then \$8,600 at 1,000 units with a \$7 overage rate. This produces the stated total-price structure while ensuring that the price is calculated from the applicable threshold and excess quantity. It is particularly useful for subscriptions, usage-based services, and capacity products where a customer receives an included quantity and pays a different marginal rate as usage grows. The product's Pricing Method should therefore be set to Block, and the administrator should configure the associated block-pricing records with the relevant lower bounds, upper bounds, block prices, and overage rates. QUESTION NO: 12

Universal Containers has a bundle with many Features. In one of these Features, Feature A, all Product Options share the same Discount Schedule.

ANSWER: B

Explanation:

Set the Discount Schedule on Product Feature A and mark the Cross Products checkbox as True on the Discount schedule. In Salesforce CPQ, a discount schedule contains tiers that determine the discount based on quantity. Enabling **Cross Products** instructs CPQ to aggregate quantities for distinct products that use the same schedule, rather than evaluating each product option's quantity independently. Therefore, when the options in Feature A are configured, CPQ totals their quantities to identify the applicable discount tier and applies the schedule's tiered discount behavior accordingly.

Assigning the shared schedule at the Product Feature level is appropriate for this bundle design because the options in that feature use the same discounting rules. It centralizes the feature's configuration and allows the options to inherit the feature-level schedule. This setup is specifically designed for a shared quantity break across multiple product options in a bundle. Salesforce documents the Cross Products setting as the mechanism for combining quantities of products associated with a discount schedule. QUESTION NO: 13

Universal Containers has a slab Discount Schedule for Product A with these Discount Tiers:

If Product A has a List Price of \$100.00, what is the Net Total for a Quote Line with the quantity of 21?

Explanation:

\$1,050.00 is correct because a Salesforce CPQ slab discount schedule applies the discount from the one tier containing the quote line's total quantity to every unit on that line. The quantity is 21, which falls in the displayed tier that provides a 50% discount. Product A's \$100.00 list price is therefore reduced by 50%, producing a net unit price of \$50.00. Multiplying that net unit price by all 21 units gives a Net Total of \$1,050.00 ($21 \times \50.00). This calculation reflects the defining behavior of a slab schedule: the qualifying quantity determines a single discount rate for the full quantity, rather than pricing portions of the quantity separately across multiple tiers. Salesforce CPQ uses discount schedules to automate quantity-based pricing, and the schedule's type determines how the tier discounts are applied. QUESTION NO: 14

Universal Containers (UC) has set the CPQ package settings of both Subscription Term Unit and Subscription Prorate Precision to Month. UC wants to quote a Fixed Price Subscription Product with a Start Date of June 18, 2019 and an End Date of August 21, 2020.

The Product record has a Subscription Term of 12, a Pricing Method of List, and a Pricebook Entry of USD 100.

What is the Prorated List Unit Price for the Quote Line?

- A. USD 118.31
- B. USD 116.67
- C. USD 125.00
- D. USD 100.00

ANSWER: B

Explanation:

USD 116.67 is correct because Salesforce CPQ uses the package-level Subscription Term Unit and Subscription Prorate Precision settings to derive the subscription's prorate multiplier. With both settings set to Month, CPQ determines the quote line's term in whole months. The period from June 18, 2019 through August 21, 2020 is treated as 14 months under month precision. The product's Subscription Term establishes that its USD 100 list price represents a 12-month subscription. CPQ therefore calculates the prorated list unit price by multiplying the list price by the ratio of the quoted term to the product term: $USD\ 100 \times 14 \div 12 = USD\ 116.666...$, which is rounded to the currency precision of USD 116.67. This is the unit price that CPQ uses for the fixed-price subscription line before any applicable discounts or additional pricing adjustments. Salesforce CPQ's subscription-proration behavior is controlled by the subscription term and prorate precision package settings, as described in [Salesforce CPQ subscription proration documentation](#) and the [Salesforce CPQ package settings documentation](#).

QUESTION NO: 15

At Universal Containers, the Fulfillment team requires that Order Item dates reflect when orders are created, rather than Quote Line start dates, because there can be gaps between anticipated versus actual start dates.

At the same time, the Account Management team wants to ensure that all items from one order appear on one contract.

What are two ways the CPQ Specialist can meet these requirements? (Choose two.)

This supports fulfillment processes where the quoted start date can differ from the real operational start date.

Set Contracting Method on the Order to Single Contract. During CPQ contracting, the contracting method determines how order products are grouped into contracts. Using Single Contract instructs CPQ to create or use one contract for all applicable products on that order, giving Account Management a unified contract record for the complete order. Together, these settings address the date requirement at order generation and the contract-grouping requirement during contracting, using standard CPQ configuration rather than custom automation. QUESTION NO: 16

Universal Containers allows clients to negotiate a discount for Product A until a specified date upon Contract activation.

Explanation:

Expiration Date, Product, and Discount

configure the essential terms of this negotiated contracted-price arrangement. Product identifies the exact item receiving the negotiated treatment, ensuring that the special commercial term is scoped to Product A. Discount stores the negotiated percentage reduction that Salesforce CPQ applies when the product is added to an eligible quote. Expiration Date defines the final date through which that negotiated discount can be used, fulfilling the requirement that the concession is only available until a specified date.

Together, these fields define the product-specific pricing entitlement and its validity period. Contracted pricing is designed to preserve customer-specific commercial terms so they can be honored on later transactions, while date-based validity

prevents a temporary concession from continuing indefinitely. In the context of an activated contract, the contracted-price record is used as the source for the negotiated product discount; its expiration setting controls when that price term ceases to be available. QUESTION NO: 17

The sales operations team at Universal Containers used the Create Order button to generate an Order with only half of the available Quote Lines and then the team selects the Ordered checkbox.

What updates should the sales operations team expect?

A second Order is generated with the remaining Quote Lines. Salesforce CPQ supports partial ordering, which allows users to create an order for only selected quote lines rather than requiring every line on the quote to be ordered at once. The first use of the Create Order action creates an Order and corresponding Order Products only for the quote lines included in that initial order. The other quote lines remain available to be ordered.

When the team subsequently marks the remaining quote lines as ordered, CPQ treats those lines as a separate ordering event. This behavior is useful when a customer accepts or receives different portions of a quote at different times, such as for phased deployments, split shipments, or staggered fulfillment. Each generated Order preserves the relationship to the originating quote while keeping the ordered line sets distinct for downstream order management and fulfillment processes.

Explanation:

An Error Condition should compare the Perpetual value against the Configuration Attribute. A Product Action using the Filter Field should Hide the Products.

is correct because a configuration rule needs both a condition that determines when the rule evaluates as true and an action that changes the configurator's available options. The Configuration Attribute is the stated trigger, so the Error Condition must evaluate that attribute's value and fire when it is set to *Perpetual*. In CPQ, Error Conditions on product rules can reference configuration attributes so that the rule responds to a user's bundle-selection choices.

Once the condition is met, the Product Action performs the requested result: hiding products. Rather than maintaining a separate action or explicit product selection for every Software product, the action can use its Filter Field capability to target the shared Product Family field, with the applicable filter value of Software. This makes the rule apply consistently to all matching options and reduces ongoing administration when products are added to that family. The action type is Hide, so the matching products are removed from the user's available selections while the Perpetual attribute value is in effect.

This approach is particularly useful when the products span multiple product families because the action can apply product-selection filtering independently of the standard product-family navigation. Users can still use the normal Add Products process when they need the full catalog, while the custom action creates a fast, repeatable workflow for the high-volume items. Salesforce CPQ custom actions are specifically intended to streamline quote-creation tasks by directing users to supported targets, including Product Selection, and can apply search filters for that target. This approach expresses the business requirement at the option-relationship level, rather than relying on a general count limit for a feature. It also keeps the bundle easy to maintain: if the administrator later changes the available options or introduces additional incompatibilities, those relationships can be managed as explicit constraints. CPQ evaluates the constraint during configuration and guides the sales user away from an invalid combination before the quote is finalized. Because the referenced quote field is a formula, its value is calculated dynamically from the current quote and related data, rather than being a static value stored on the product option. This provides the desired value immediately at configuration-page load and lets the administrator maintain the defaulting logic declaratively in the quote formula. The formula must return a value compatible with the text configuration attribute, and the configuration attribute's target field remains the Product Option field where CPQ stores the selected or defaulted configuration value. This approach is particularly useful when the initial attribute value depends on quote context, such as account information, quote fields, or other formula-accessible data. Salesforce CPQ documents configuration attributes and their use in product configuration in the [Salesforce Help configuration attributes documentation](#). Asset and Opportunity Product is correct. The Asset Conversion setting controls how Salesforce CPQ represents non-subscription purchases as assets during the contracting process. With Asset Conversion set to *One per unit*, a contracted quantity of two for Product A produces two individual Asset records, each representing one purchased unit. This is useful when each unit must be independently tracked, amended, renewed, or replaced.

When Salesforce CPQ generates the renewal opportunity from the contract, it uses the contract's renewable asset records to create the renewal opportunity's products. Because the original purchase was converted into two separate assets, the renewal opportunity contains multiple Opportunity Product records related to Product A—one for each asset. This preserves the independent lifecycle of the purchased units at renewal time, allowing each unit to be addressed separately in the renewal transaction.

Setting the filter's value to True supplies the required criterion for the Boolean subscription field.

Marking the filter as hidden is equally important because the criterion becomes enforced rather than exposed as an editable search control. Sales reps therefore cannot clear, change, or bypass the subscription criterion while using the Add Subscriptions action. The action consistently opens a product-selection experience containing only products that meet the predefined subscription condition. This approach keeps the restriction in the CPQ search configuration, where it applies

every time the custom action is used, while still allowing administrators to manage the filter centrally. Salesforce CPQ's product-selection and search-filter capabilities are designed to control the set of products users can find and add during configuration. This gives representatives a guided way to capture the selections as part of the product configuration experience.

The values selected through configuration attributes are retained on the relevant quote line and can be used by downstream CPQ processes. For example, they can support pricing logic, product rules, quote-document output, approvals, or order information, while the organization continues to manage one core product rather than maintaining a large catalog of nearly identical products. This approach avoids the administrative burden and reporting complexity caused by creating a unique SKU for each regional, color, and size variation. This approach keeps the filtering activity in the product-selection workflow, where reps need it, and uses CPQ's native product-search configuration rather than requiring a bundle configuration process or custom automation. Search filters are intended to help users narrow a potentially large product catalog using relevant Product fields. By explicitly setting the child account's price to the product's \$300 list price, the administrator preserves contracted-pricing behavior while establishing the required account-specific exception.

Setting Ignore Parent Contracted Prices to true on the business unit account record is also valid. This account-level setting prevents Salesforce CPQ from considering contracted prices inherited from parent accounts when pricing quotes for that business unit. Consequently, the parent's \$200 contracted price, including its Storage product-family filter, is not applied to the child account. With no applicable child-level contracted price or other price rule changing the price, CPQ uses the product's list price of \$300. This setting is particularly useful where a business unit should not inherit any of the parent account's negotiated pricing arrangements rather than requiring exceptions product by product. Changing **Option layout to Tabs on the bundle Product** organizes the configurator into feature-based tabs. Instead of presenting every feature and option in one long continuous page, users can select the relevant tab and work within that focused area. This is a direct layout setting for making a large bundle easier to navigate.

Changing **Enable Large Configuration to True on the bundle Product** uses Salesforce CPQ's large-configuration experience for bundles with substantial numbers of options. It is intended to improve usability and performance for large bundles by presenting the configuration in a more manageable, navigable form rather than requiring users to work through an extensive single-page option list. Together, hiding system options, using a tabbed layout, and enabling the large-configuration experience make the bundle materially easier to configure. Together, the two layouts ensure that the Monthly Price column appears for Net 30 quotes while a complete line-item table still prints for other payment terms. This design keeps document presentation logic in the quote template and bases the decision on a quote-level field, which is appropriate because Payment Terms is a quote attribute. Template Top is the only section that can show Billing/Shipping info. Template Top is the specialized quote-template content type for the document's header-area quote and account details, including the standard billing and shipping address information. This lets the generated document consistently place those customer details at the beginning of the quote.

Quote Terms can be dynamic if Term Conditions are defined. Salesforce CPQ evaluates term conditions to determine which quote terms should appear for a particular quote. Administrators can therefore maintain terms centrally and conditionally include the applicable language based on quote data, rather than creating a separate quote template for every terms scenario.

QUESTION NO: 31

An admin is working on a Primary Quote attached to an Opportunity. The nice Book and Currency on the Quote and Opportunity match. However, only some of the Products from the Quote are being synced to the Opportunity, and error messages are displayed.

Only Products with an Effective Quantity greater than zero sync to the Opportunity is also correct: Salesforce CPQ uses effective quantity when determining whether a quote line represents a sellable quantity that should create an Opportunity Product. Quote lines whose effective quantity is zero are omitted from the synchronization result. Finally, Exclude from Opportunity is checked on the Product record directly instructs CPQ not to create an Opportunity Product for quote lines using that product. This setting is useful for items that should appear on a customer-facing quote but should not be represented in the Opportunity's product list. These conditions can therefore result in only a subset of quote lines syncing without changing the quote's primary status or its matching price book and currency context. This setup also supports later service, replacement, and customer-asset management processes because each physical item is represented independently.

Lines assigned to different product families are placed in their corresponding separate orders. This configuration lets an administrator control fulfillment or downstream processing by product grouping without manually dividing the quote into separate transactions.

These settings belong on the quote because the order-generation behavior and its grouping rule apply to the quote as a whole. This intentional difference allows CPQ to calculate a price from block tiers while preserving the opportunity's product quantity in the appropriate unit of measure.

The Quote Line is on an amendment Quote and has a different Quantity from its original Quote Line is also correct. Amendment quotes distinguish the customer's resulting subscription quantity from the quantity change relative to the existing contract. CPQ uses the amendment's effective or delta quantity when creating the opportunity product impact, while the quote line can retain the total amended quantity. For example, increasing an existing subscription from five units to eight units produces a three-unit commercial change even though the amended quote line reflects eight units as the resulting entitlement. Together, Approval Variables provide the values used in the process and Approval Conditions determine the routing behavior based on those values.

Product A having "Exclude From Opportunity" set to TRUE is also a direct cause. This product-level setting explicitly prevents Salesforce CPQ from syncing quote lines for that product to Opportunity Products. The quote line can therefore remain available for the sales representative to review and adjust on the primary quote, but no Opportunity Line Item is created after the quote is saved or synchronized. Administrators commonly use this setting for products that are needed for quoting, internal tracking, or bundle configuration but should not be represented as independent opportunity products.

The Add Products button has a Search Filter associated to it because CPQ search filters restrict the product results available from a product-selection action. A search filter can evaluate product fields and, where configured, related quote or account data. The product must satisfy the filter criteria to be returned on the Product Selection page. Consequently, an active product can still be absent from the Add Products results when it does not meet the action's search-filter conditions. Salesforce documents search filters as a way to limit the products users can find and select, while its product-configuration guidance describes the role of components in bundles. With the group beginning on June 4, 2020, an end date of December 3, 2021 gives Products C and D the requested longer subscription period, while the first group can retain its own schedule ending June 3, 2021.

Changing the Subscription Term on Quote Line Group 2 to the value 18 is also valid. CPQ uses subscription terms and dates to determine the subscription period and prorated pricing. Starting on June 4, 2020, an 18-month term runs through December 3, 2021. Applying the term at the quote line group level ensures that the common schedule applies consistently to both Products C and D. Quote line groups are specifically intended to support distinct sections of a quote, including separate subscription terms and date behavior where needed. A second Quote Line condition using SBQQ__ProductOption__c not equal to null limits the result to lines created from product options, rather than standalone products or parent bundle lines. Because the price rule uses "Conditions Met = All," both conditions must be true before its price action sets the custom quote checkbox to true. This

directly implements the requirement at the quote level while evaluating the qualifying bundle-option line data. Salesforce CPQ price rules can evaluate quote-line fields through price conditions and then update a field on the quote using a price action. Administrators enable this behavior in the installed package settings and should align the quote approval process and quote statuses with their organization's order-creation workflow.

Using List Unit Price as the target preserves that sequence and makes the calculated value available for downstream pricing and discount calculations. Salesforce documents that price rules evaluate conditions and use price actions to update target fields during quote calculation; the calculation can therefore alter quote-line pricing values from their initial price book values. The maintenance product uses its Percent Of Total Category value to identify which eligible lines it should evaluate. Each Storage subscription product must carry that same category and be explicitly included in the percent-of-total calculation, so its quote-line amount contributes to the total on which maintenance is calculated. When users add eligible Storage subscription products to a quote, Salesforce CPQ totals the included matching lines and applies the configured percentage on the maintenance product. This supports a maintenance charge that automatically scales as the value of the applicable Storage subscriptions changes, rather than retaining the former fixed \$500 price. The product configuration therefore keeps the maintenance product as the calculated item while identifying the Storage subscriptions as the contributing products.
