This is the sort of contextual relationship tested in GRE Text Completion questions: the sentence supplies a contrast between the optimistic emotional framing that first dominated the press and later reporting that introduces serious medical realities. The first word must characterize the tone of the newer accounts, while the second must express how those accounts relate to the earlier coverage. “Sobering” and “counterbalancing” work together logically and grammatically, creating a coherent contrast without claiming that the initial stories were false. It does not show that the policy had no effect on car use or that parking availability was the sole explanation for increased ridership.
